


ABRAHAM BLACKWELL S. 18328 BA-J/MLB

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your personal request of June 3, for the Revolutionary war record of Abraham Blackwell (S. 1838).

The record of Abraham Blackwell follows as found in the papers on file in pension claim, S. 18528, based upon his service in the Revolutionary Wer.

Abraham Blackwell was born September 11, 1742; the place of his birth and names of parents are not given.

Abraham Blackwell enlisted in the State of South Carolina early in the Revolutionary War, date not stated, served at various times until the close of the war, smounting in all to more than two years as a private under Captains Elisha Mages, Hardysam, Du Boss, Fair and John Watts, and Colonels Benton and Helbs in the South Carolina troops; he stated that he served also under various other officers including Ensign Holmes and that during his service he was in the battle of Bacca's Bridge, several skirmishes, in an engagement on Lynch's Greek and in the battle of Batts Springs.

The soldier moved about 1783 to Chesterfield District, South Carolina.

Abraham Blackwell was allowed pension on his application executed February 9, 1833, while a resident of Chesterfield District, South Carolina. He died about 1835.

Reforence was made to Abraham Blackwell's wife, Sarah, who died sometime in 1830, no other details in regard to her given, also to soldier's son, James Blackwell, who was alive in 1850, his place of residence not stated. No other reforence was made to children. In order to obtain date of last payment of pension, the name of person paid and possibly the exact date of death of Abraham Blackwell, you should write to the Comptroller General, Conseal Assounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following:


