Anderson County } October Term of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions  
1835. Appeared Andrew Mill in open Court and was duly sworn according to  
Law on his oath he states that he was born the 12<sup>th</sup> day of September in the  
Year 1759, agreeable to the register which he has said to be kept by his  
Father in Morris County in the State of New Jersey that his Father moved  
from there on Long Island before the Revolution and was there at the  
Commencement of the war and there the said Andrew entered the service of  
the United States as Minute Man & served as Drummer and continued three  
or Months to the best of his recollection and continued to serve with  
intermission of short intervals of service agreeable to his Declaration on file  
in the office of the Commissioner of Pensions that on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of June  
1835, he filed his Declaration before a Justice of the Peace out of Court  
for the purpose of obtaining a Pension for services rendered the United  
States agreeable to an act of Congress and sent the same to the Commissioner  
of Pensions and is there on file appears not allowed because not done in  
open Court and a Certificate of the Court annexed thereto, the Court now  
in Session examined the said Andrew Mill agreeable to the Direction of  
the War Department we believe him to be of the age here stated & a soldier  
of the Revolution and served in behalf the United States the lapse of  
time with the great loss of Memory it appears impossible for him  
to state the Year or Year and fully the length of his services and the  
Names of all his Officers except Capt. Wright & Col. Lashier he has no  
written evidence & knows no person by whom he could prove his service

Amson County On this 12<sup>th</sup> day of June 1835, Personally appeared Andrew  
Nelly aged 70, years before Alfred Sinclair one of the acting Justices of  
the Peace in & for said County who being first duly sworn according to Law  
doth on his oath Make the following Declaration in order to Obtain the  
benefit of the Provision made by the Act of Congress Passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832,  
"He states that he was a Soldier of the revolutionary War that he was born  
in the State of New Jersey Morris County near Morris Town the 12<sup>th</sup> day of  
September 1759, that his Father Moved from there to Long Island there residing  
before & at the Commencement of the revolutionary War he there volunteered in the  
Service of the United States for Twelve Months the Year he does not recollect  
under Capt. John White & served as Drummer & kept hold the fort on Long  
Island & was there in a Battle after was Marched to New York & there held  
under Col. Sacher & was there when New York was taken by the British from  
there was Marched to Kings Bridge there kept hold a fort near there in a  
Battle sometime after his term of Service was out received a Discharge from  
Col. Sacher he then as a Volunteer for six Months & was Marched up the North  
River from there to the State of New Jersey & to many Places in the State till  
his time of Service was out & received a Discharge in short time was a  
Volunteer he thinks for no certain time the Year & the names of his Officers is  
not recollected & was Marched near the Sea on a Creek & there stationed he  
thinks it was Two Months from there he was Marched to many Places he  
supposes that he served five Months before he applied for & obtained a  
Discharge. Short time after he was a Volunteer in Morris Town the Year & his  
Officers is not recollected he thinks for no certain time he was Marched from  
there to reinforce the Army when Burgoin was taken but did not reach  
the Place in time he was then Marched to many places he supposes he served  
three Months that time before he applied for & received a Discharge & from what  
Officers he does not recollect in short time a Volunteer near Morris Town for  
no certain time the Year & his Officers names is not recollected he was Marched to  
Elizabeth Town & there stationed he thinks Two Months & did not serve but soon  
after before he applied for & obtained a Discharge that time after a Volunteer in  
Morris Town for no certain time he was there stationed one Month before the  
Close of the War the Year & the names of his Officers is not recollected he was  
then Discharged he then returned to his Father on Long Island there he  
thinks he resided one Year then Moved to North Carolina Amson County

Near the State line where he resided twenty five years then moved short distance  
the South side of the line Chesterfield District & Eighteen <sup>miles</sup> from any Court  
House & being very ignorant of body & mind is his reasons for making his  
Declarations in this way & he living in a Poor barren part of the Country that  
he did not know of any laws passed in his favour till about Twelve months  
Past he then went to a friend living some distance from him to do his business &  
not knowing in what way it was to be done he did not <sup>know</sup> but it was done till  
short time past is his reasons for not making applications sooner. He states  
he served from the time he entered the service of the United States on Long Is-  
land to the Close of the War with the exceptions of short intervals but his  
Memory is not sufficient to state his services his officers Names or the different  
Years of his service he knows of no Person by whom he could Prove his service

He states that he was born the 12<sup>th</sup> day of September 1787

In Morris County near Morris Town in the State of New Jersey he has a  
record of his age he states he is by his father,

He was living on Long Island in the State of New York where his father  
had moved previous to the Revolutionary War then he entered the service of  
the United States as a Soldier & served Twelve Months under Capt. John  
White & served as Drummer after the Close of the War he returned to Long  
Island then he resided he thinks Twelve Months then moved to North  
Carolina Anson County near the State line there resided twenty five  
years then moved the South side of the line Chesterfield District and  
continues there to reside. he is not certain John was his <sup>own</sup> name but white,

He states the loss of Memory he cannot recollect the names of the  
regular officers but Gen. Washington because he noticed him more  
than any other.

He states that he believes he received a Discharge at the end of  
every term of service but have lost them,

He states the names of John Stetson & Joseph Stetson whom he is  
now known & has been for many years that live not far from him

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to Pension or  
Annuity except the present & declares that his name is not on the  
Pension roll of this agency of any State,

Sworn & subscribed this day & year as above Francis Miller  
of his own free will

We Wm Stetson Clergyman residing near the Neighborhood of Joseph Stetson  
residing near the same hereby Certify that we are well acquainted with  
Andrew Mills the above Applicant who has subscribed & sworn to the above  
Declaration that we believe him to be of the age there in stated that he is  
116 years & believed in the Neighborhood where he resides to have been a  
Soldier of the revolution & that we concur in that opinion,

And from our long acquaintance with the applicant that there is a  
great loss of Memory within six years past & from our knowledge of the  
Country where he resides the reasons he has given in his Declaration for not  
applying sooner & in this way are good

State of North Carolina are well acquainted with Andrew Mills the  
above Applicant & do here by declare his opinion after the investigation of

that the above applicant was a Soldier of the revolution & served as stated  
and that Wm Stetson he believes to be a Clergyman & Joseph Stetson is a  
man of Credit,

Sir the Declaration of Andrew Mills you returned for a Mendonset you state that it does not appear there was such service under Col Lashier ~~at that~~ at the time of Drawing his Declaration & it is stated that he volunteered as a Minute man under Capt. Wile & served as Drums for the time he served under Capt. Wile on Long Island & after marched to New York then under Col Lashier he states the time together to be twelve Months to the best of his recollection and from that time he was very little out of the service of the United States to the Close of the War his other services was in detail & transferred from one Company to another & when time of service he applied for a Discharge as security but was not long out of service as he follows no occupation his Officers Names he does not recollect his Memory is not sufficient on a full length of his services, The proceedings before the Magistrate & Clergyman was strict & believe more so than the Court I have attended to business of the same kind in Court they are taken up with other business therefore not so strictly examined as before a Magistrate Clergyman & Neighbors who at that time attends to no other business, The Magistrate Clergyman & Neighbors at the time of taking his Declaration agreed that he did serve that a man raised where he states & then continued till after the Close of the war must have rendered service to the United States at that time, The lapse of time & the loss of Memory & the Manner which he served he cannot now recollect his Officers Names or the full length of his services, he appears to decline being carried eighteen or twenty Miles to a Court for the sole purpose of being interrogated again, after seeing Mr. Mills I write you as within & enclose to you the same Declaration for your further consideration on the services of this old Soldier of the Revolution & Grant him such part of the balance of his life as you may think just, in examining some of these old Soldiers who has greatly lost their Memory they get impatient and mad he is one, you will give an answer,
