State of North Carolina ~~the~~ Court of Pleas and Quarter
Buncombe County ~~the~~ Sylva October 1832.

On this 18th day of October 1832 personally appeared in open court before the Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions for the County aforesaid now setting Jonathan Pinewood a resident in said County and State aged 74 years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated.

That he was drafted in what was then called Loberace District South Carolina in the fall of the year 1778. That he marched soon after in the company commanded by Captain Jacob Johnston who resigned shortly after they started, after which the company was commanded by Lieutenant Bayard Hendricks in the Battalion commanded by Major Robert Floyd. That he marched by George Town to Santee Bay in South Carolina where they were stationed two or three weeks. That he marched from there to Haderly's point where they were stationed two or three weeks. That he went from there to Fort Johnson on James Island near Charleston S.C. where he remained until discharged having served about four months.

That he entered the service again in March 1779 in the company commanded by Captain ~~James~~ ^{Thomas} ~~Baldwin~~ as a drafted Mulatto man in the Battalion under the command of Major Robert Floyd. That he marched to Orangeburgh in South Carolina where he was stationed for some time under the command of General William Moultrie. That he marched from there to the Savannah River to a place called The Black Swamp, where he stayed but a few days until he was marched to Pittsburgh in Pa. where he remained one week and returned to Black Swamp.

from thence they marched to Charlestown under the command of General Montagu being closely pursued by the British, that he arrived at Charlestown early in May, where he remained until about the middle of July when he was discharged, having served about four months.

That the step to which he belonged was called upon again in the month of May 1780 when he marched in the company commanded by Captain William Hendrick in the Battalion commanded by Major Samuel Burton, to South Carolina where they were stationed about a week, from thence they marched down the River to Linck's Trap way, from there to George Town and from there by Pender to Linck's Creek near Socie & Hill where he was discharged having been out about one month.

That he marched again in the month of October 1781, in a company of Horse commanded by Captain William Hendrick to South Carolina where he joined the troops commanded by General Francis Marion, that he continued under his command about two months when he was again discharged.

That he joined the troops under Genl Marion again in the month of June 1782 and remained in the army something less than one month when he was taken sick and got a permit to return home. That he joined the Troops under General Marion again in the fall of 1782 in the company commanded by Captain Thomas Elby, that he remained under his command forty days, when he was again discharged. That he knows of no person now living by whom he can prove his said services, he hereby relinquishes every claim to a Pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the rolls of the agency of any state.



now in Leipsoe, son of Jonathan Pennington, a resident in said County of Buncombe and still
aforesaid aged seventy four years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth
on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the act of Parliament June 4th 1832. That he entered the service of the United States under
the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That he was drafted in what was then called Chester District South Carolina in the
fall of the year 1776 he thinks about the first of October as a drummer that he was
marched soon after in the Company commanded by Captain Jacob Johnson who
resigned shortly after they started after which the Company was commanded by
Lieutenant Benjamin Hendricks in the Battalion commanded by Major Robert
Lloyd that he marched to George Town to see Hesley Bay in South Carolina where they
were stationed two or three weeks that he marched from there to Hesley's point
where they were stationed two or three weeks, that he went from there to Fort Moultrie
on James Island near Charleston South Carolina under Capt. Hugh Murphy who took command
at Hesley's point above mentioned and that he remained at that fort until he
was discharged in February having served four months as drummer.

That he was called into the service again in March the first 1779 in the company
commanded by Captain Thomas Cleby as a drafted Militia man in the Battalion
commanded by Major Robert Lloyd that he was marched to Orangeburg South
Carolina where he was stationed about two weeks under the command of General William Lee
Greer, that he marched from there to the Savannah River to a place called the
Black swamp, where he stayed but a few days then marched to Beaufort Liberia
where he remained one week and returned to Black swamp, from thence they
marched to Charleston SC under the command of General Moultrie being constantly
pursued by the British, that he arrived in Charleston early in May when he remained
until in July when he was discharged he thinks about the middle of that month having
served as drummer at least four months he thinks four or five and was taken back
after being discharged and was detained about ten days before he reached home.

That the Company which he belonged was called upon again in the month of May
1780 when he marched in the company commanded by Captain William Hendricks
in the Battalion commanded by Major Samuel Bowton, to Santa Barbara
California where they were stationed about a week, from thence they marched
down the river to Lick's Crag way, from there to George Town and from thence
up Pecos to Lick's Creek near Society Hill where he was discharged in June having
served one month or about that time as a private, being known as drummer.

That he was again drafted and marched in the month of October 1781 in a company
of Horse, as a militia Horse man commanded by Captain William Hendricks
to Santa Barbara where he joined the Troops commanded by General Francis Marion that
he continued under his command two months and was again discharged.

That he was again called out in June 1782 in the company commanded by Captain
Robert Pepple by whom he was appointed Sergeant and marched to Rancho Hills
in Pecos where he joined the Troops commanded by General Marion and served
three weeks as sergeant at which time he was taken sick and got a permit to go home
and he did so in the month of July 1782 returning to

order that he marched from there to the Savannah River to a place called Black swamp, where he stayed but a few days then marched to Beaufort S.C., where he remained one week and returned to Black swamp, from there they marched to Charleston still under the command of General Moultrie being constantly pursued by the British, that he arrived in Charleston early in May when he remained until about the 1st of June when he was discharged he thinks about the middle of that month having served as drummer at least four months & he thinks four & a half and was taken sick after being discharged and was detained about ten days before he reached home.

That the Corps to which he belonged was called upon again in the month of May 1780 when he marched in the company Commanded by Captain William Hendricks in the Battalion Commanded by Major General Bowler, to Santa Fe in South Carolina where they were stationed about a week, from there they marched down the river to Beaufort Cross way, from there to George Town and from thence up Pease to Larchet's Creek near Society Hill where he was discharged in June having served one month or about that time as a private, having drummed as drummer.

That he was again drafted and marched in the Month of October 1781 in a company of Horse, as a milch Horse man Commanded by Captain William Hendricks to Santa Fe where he joined the Troops Commanded by General Marion that he continued under his command two months and was again discharged.

That he was again called out in June 1782 in the company Commanded by Captain Robert Pigley by whom he was appointed Sergeant and marched to Beaufort S.C. in Pedro where he joined the Troops Commanded by General Marion and served three weeks as Sergeant at which time he was taken sick and got a permit to go home.

That he joined the Troops again under General Marion in the Fall of 1782 sometime in the month of October in the Company Commanded by Thomas City Captain that he remained under his Command and served forty days as Sergeant during the whole of which time we were stationed at Fort Des near Moncks Corner about 32 miles North of Charleston where he was discharged and was about five days having home. That he knows of no person living by whom he can prove his service as above stated that he has no documentary evidence of his service having never seen his discharge since he sent them on to obtain his indent. He hereby relinquishes all claim to a Pension or annuity except the present and declares that his Name is not on the rolls of the Agency of any state.

Question 1st. Where and in what year were you born? Jonathan Redwood
Answer 1st. I was born on Thompson Creek about fourteen miles of Cheraw Hill on River in Christyfield district in South Carolina on the 1st day of October in the year 1758.
Q. 2nd. Have you any Record of your age and if so where is it?
A. 2nd. Yes. I have it at home. I took it from my Father's Family Bible and have preserved it ever since.
Q. 3rd. Where were you living when Called into the Service; Where have you lived since the Revolution, and where do you now live?
A. 3rd. I was living up in Cheraw District now called Christyfield District in the State of South Carolina at the place where I was born. and I remained at the same place about fifteen years after I retired from the Army and then moved to Darlington District South Carolina where I lived about twelve years.

I then moved to North Carolina in the County of Beaufort where I now live on the water of French broad.

Q. At what time were you called into Service; were you drafted, did you volunteer or were you upon a Substitute, and if a Substitute for whom?

A. 4th I was drafted, I never volunteered except in Scouting parties after the terms of which I have taken no notice in my claim, nor do I ever know as a Substitute.

Q. 5th State the names of some of the Regular officers who were with the Party when you served, such Continental and Militia Regiments as you can recollect and the General Circumstances of your service.

A. 6th The first Regular officer that I recall to have been of the Regiment into the Service at Orangeburg when we met with General Moultrie with him were Major Simmons and some others whose names I do not now recollect but Col. Marion Simmons I believe was a Regular General. He was with the troops sent with us to Charleston and there I saw him with a few men into the British ranks and lost about forty of his men while under the command of General Marion I believe several regular officers among whom were Col. Holley — Colonel Maynor both of whom commanded Troops of Horse men I recollect before I was under General Marion of the 1st Regt. Commanded by Col. Moultrie the 3rd Commanded by Col. Thompson both Continental of Militia Regiments one Commanded by Col. Giles one Commanded by Col. Bowes below where we marched and the one in which I served first was commanded by Col. Blodges who resign'd and was succeeded by Col. Calhoun who was soon afterwards killed by the Tories. After I went under Genl. Marion I only recollect any Continental Regiment except those under his command I still have the Militia regiments above mentioned but do not recollect by whom they were commanded. The General circumstances of my service are mentioned in the foregoing declaration. I was in no engagements except at one under General Moultrie at Crooked Creek between Petersburg and Charles town in which we were routed by the British after a contest of about fifteen minutes and fled before them to Charles town where we remained until July and one engagement under Genl. Marion when a scouting party of us became in contact with certain British & Tories four took eleven of them Prisoners Q. 6th Are you now a Discharge; and if so where is it and by whom was it given A. 6th Yes I now a Discharge at the end of the first four months term of Capt. Hendrick, anyone at the end of the 2^d four months term from Capt. Thomas Eddy soon after end of the month term from Major Samuel Benton, one at the end of the 3^d months term from Capt. William Hendrick on the last one from Capt. Thomas Eddy at the end of my last service; but I have not any of them now. As I state on the other page I sent them to the Treasury office in South Carolina as evidence of my service in order to receive an indent which I obtained. I have not seen them since nor do I know what has become with them. Question 7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who contributed to your character for veracity and their belief of your service as a Soldier of the Revolution.

Testimony of Mr. Miller Esq.

We Thomas the 2d of August 1861
Esq. Commissioner for Beaufort County, North Carolina in Roanoke

I still have the Militia Regiment above mentioned but do not recollect by whom they were commanded. The General Circumstances of my service are mentioned in the foregoing Declaration. I was in no engagements except at one under General Moultrie at Charleston between Parisburg and Charleston in which we were routed by the British after a Contest of about fifteen minutes and fled before them to Charleston where we remained until July and one engagement under Genl Marion when a scouting party of us came in contact with certain British & militia forces took eleven of them Prisoners 36k and you receive a discharge; and if so where is it and by whom was it given. A 6th I received a discharge at the end of the first four months to me signed by Capt. Elihu Smith, an officer of the 2^d Regt from Capt. Thomas Elby soon after the end of the month from Major Samuel Benton, one of the end of the month from Capt. William Hendrick and the last one from Capt. Thomas Elby at the end of my last service; but I have not any of them now. As I state on the other page I sent them to the Treasury Office in South Carolina as evidence of my service in order to receive an indulgence which I obtained. I have not seen them since nor do I know what has become of them. Question 11. State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who can testify to your character for veracity and their belief of your service as a soldier of the Revolution.
