On this fifteenth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine, personally appeared before Turner Bryan Esquire Judge of the Court of Ordinary for the District aforesaid, Rebecca Thirrell a resident of the District of Charleston in the State aforesaid, aged eighty five years on the twelfth day of April last, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed July 6th 1838. That she is the widow of Moses Thirrell who was a Private in the Army of the Revolution; that the said Moses Thirrell entered the service as an enlisted soldier in the second Regiment and served three years which she believes was the time for which he was enlisted, but at what time he entered the service or under what Officers he served, this deponent does not know except that he (the said Moses Thirrell) was enlisted by Col. Spencer, afterwards Col. Spencer, but what rank the said Spencer then held she does not know. This deponent believes that the said Moses Thirrell marched directly to Charleston after he enlisted and that he remained near Charleston the whole three years, she believes that the said Moses Thirrell was in an engagement whilst stationed on Bearfort Island near Charleston, South Carolina. That the said Moses has two brothers, Abram & David Thirrell who were in the army at the same time and both of whom died at or near Charleston; that the said Moses Thirrell, after the expiration of the three years service aforesaid returned home in the month of July, but in what year this deponent does not know, that the deponent and the said Moses Thirrell were married by Sophia Vining a Baptist Preacher, in the District of Charleston, South Carolina, in the month of October after the return of the said Moses Thirrell as above stated, but in what year she does not know.

but believes it was about two years before the defeat of
Genl Gates near Camden, South Carolina; that shortly
after the marriage of the said Moses as above stated,
he was drafted for a term of two months, that he
marched to Charleston & was there the Christmas
after he was married; that he served the two months
but in what Company or Regiment, or under what
Officers this deponent does not know. He does not
know that he was in any engagement during the
last mentioned term of service - at what time the
said Moses Thurrell was drafted she does not know,
but he returned home in the month of February,
that the said Moses Thurrell then remained at home and
raised one crop, but early in the next spring he was
again drafted for five months, as this deponent
believes; that he left home before the crop was
planted and did not return until this she
has raised; that he was at or near Charleston
the whole five months, but she does not know that the
said Moses Thurrell was in any engagement during
the five months, nor does she know the Company or
Regiment in which, nor the Officers under whom, he
served. That she is wholly illiterate and has no doc-
umentary proof either of her marriage, or of the
service of her husband, nor does she know of any of
the companions in arms of the said Moses Thurrell
who are now ~~living~~.

She further declares that she was married to the said Moses
Thurrell in the month of October as before stated but in
what year she does not know, except that it was about
two years before the defeat of Genl Gates as aforesaid,
that her husband, the aforesaid Moses Thurrell, died on
the twenty day of July about the year 1787, and that
she has remained a widow ever since that period, as
will more fully appear to the proofs hereinafter
shown to be submitted, on the day & year
above written, before

Millington Huggins personally came before me James Bryan Esquire Judge of the Court of Ordinary for Christ Church District and being duly sworn saith, that he is the brother of Lemuel Thistle who has made the foregoing declaration; that at the time the said declaration was sworn to Moses Thistle, this deponent was a boy; that at the time the said declaration was sworn the said Thistle lived with his grand father Edmund Tetter; that this deponent was not present at the marriage, but recollects to have seen at his grandfather's when the said declaration, Moses Thistle returned from being married (as it was then said); that the said Moses Thistle ever after, from the death of the said Moses, lived together as husband and wife, & was always so regarded; this deponent always believed & still believes that the said Moses Thistle was married as is said in the declaration of the said declaration; this deponent further saith that he knows that the said Moses Thistle served our town in the war of the Revolution before he was married, and two years after he was married; this deponent cannot say of his own knowledge the length of time the said Moses lived either time, but has always understood & believed & still believes that he served as stated in the foregoing declaration of the said declaration; this deponent further saith that he does not recollect the year in which the said Moses Thistle died, but knows that he died shortly after the war of the Revolution, & died that the said declaration was remained a widow ever since.

Rebecca F. Dore personally came before me James Bryan Esquire Judge of the Court of Ordinary in for Christ Church District, who being first duly sworn saith, that she has heard her husband Colonel Francis Dore and who was an officer in the War of the Revolution. She says that Moses Thistle the husband of declaration Thistle who has made the foregoing declaration was enlisted by him and that he served in the War of the Revolution; that the said Colonel Dore after the war settled in the neighbourhood of the said Moses Thistle and was always kind & attentive to the said Thistle, who was a very poor man, saying he was a good soldier in the War of the Revolution; he knows that the said Moses Thistle lived together until the death

of the said Alous, as husband & wife & were so considered in
the neighborhood & this deponent believes they were a
legally married couple; she further believes that the said
Leticia has remained a widow ever since the death of
the said Alous; and she believes the said Leticia
worthy of credit.

This last claim was not allowed as there was no proof of the duration of soldier's service.

Before me personally appeared Elizabeth Crowley aged upwards of sixty years who being first duly sworn according to law on oath says that she was well acquainted with Susanna Sherrell widow of Moses Sherrell late of Whitfield District deceased since her first recollection and well recollects the occurrence of her marriage to Moses Sherrell that was not present at the marriage which took place about three miles from where she deposes; that the marriage took place at the house of one John Horrie and well recollects that it was some years before the fall of Charleston South Carolina. That some time after her marriage the said Moses Sherrell enlisted in the South Carolina Line but cannot recollect under what officers and was repeatedly at her house during the absence of her said husband and thinks he was ordered to guard the western frontier of South Carolina while in said service and was well acquainted with said Susanna Sherrell up to the time of her death.

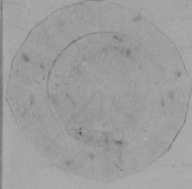

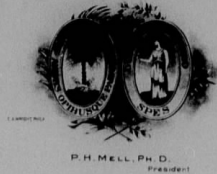
