Declaration of Thomas Davis in order to obtain  
the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.  
The State of South Carolina,  
Chesterfield District.

On this fourteenth day of  
March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight  
hundred and thirty six, personally appeared in open  
Court, before the Court of Common Pleas and General  
Sessions, now sitting, Thomas Davis a resident of  
the State and District of aforesaid, who being first  
duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make  
the following Declaration, in order to obtain the benefit  
of the act of Congress, passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

That he was born on the 22<sup>d</sup> March, 1780 in the district  
and State of aforesaid, that his age was set down first in  
a Prayer Book & afterwards in a Bible one of which  
was his father's, that his elder brother died upon  
of three after his father's death and this deponent  
does not know what has become of him.

That he entered the service of the United States under the  
officer named & served as stated in the account.

That he was drafted & sent three days before Christmas in  
the year \_\_\_\_\_ and served as a private under Capt.  
Ellis Murphy & Lt. Col. Robert Lloyd, that he does not  
recollect the Regiment to which he belonged; that he was  
marched to a place called the "Long Bluff" on Santee  
River in the State of aforesaid, from thence to Sea Wm Bay  
from thence to Haddo Point and from thence to James  
Island near Charleston from whence he returned

2.3 hours having been in this tour nine weeks.  
That he was again drafted and marched as a private  
under Capt. John Beville and Col. George Hicks to  
Charleston in the District and State aforesaid where he

1. remained one month & returned home.  
That he was again drafted as a private & that on the  
8<sup>th</sup> day of Sept. (year not recollect) he marched under  
Capt. Eller & Col. George Hicks - Crossed Black River  
at Buston & crossed Santee at Lamoni ferry & arrived  
to Charleston - That he was in Charleston at the time  
it was taken by the British under Clinton where he  
was taken prisoner on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of May after his March  
13<sup>th</sup> & was discharged on parole on the 19<sup>th</sup> of the same month

having served this tour up to the time he was taken prisoner  
that month and four days.  
That he served two tours, of two weeks each, as one of  
a scouting party.  
That he was again drafted and marched as a private  
under Capt. William Brewster to U.S. Ferry, ~~on~~<sup>near</sup> the Concourse River in the State aforesaid, where  
Col. Washington took command - that he returned  
home from U.S. Ferry having served this tour  
one month, and remained at home two months.  
That he was drafted again, and served as a private  
under Capt. Benton & Major Christian Thomas for  
one month. That he never received a discharge.  
He hereby relinquishes any claim to a pension or  
annuity except the present and dollars that his  
name is set on the pension roll of the agency of  
my State.

passed 23<sup>rd</sup> March 1868 entitled an act granting pensions  
to certain widows also the acts 17<sup>th</sup> June 1844 and 2<sup>nd</sup> a  
February 1848 and 29<sup>th</sup> July 1848 that the declarant  
aforesaid William Davis in behalf of his mother Nancy  
Davis widow of Thomas Davis late of Chesterfield District  
deceased, states that the said Thomas Davis was a soldier  
in the army of the Revolution as the heir undesignated and  
believe and as such was allowed a pension first by the State  
of South Carolina at the rate of Sixty dollars per annum  
and was afterwards pensioned by the United States  
under Act 4<sup>th</sup> June 1832 at the rate twenty seven  
dollars & thirty two cents per annum, and that he  
always understood from his father, Said Thomas Davis  
that the principal part of his service was done in the  
Ninth horse or Cavalry under Captain Fredwoods,  
Regues & others, Genl. Marion, and that the aforesaid  
Thomas Davis was married to his aforesaid mother  
Nancy Davis in Chesterfield District South Carolina  
in the year one thousand seven hundred & eighty seven  
or eight (1787 or 1788) and as husband and wife  
they lived together until the death of Said Thomas  
Davis who died in the District of Chesterfield South  
Carolina on the twentieth day of March one thousand  
eight hundred and forty five (1845) leaving his  
wife Nancy a widow who is still living but from  
extreme old age and bodily infirmity is unable  
to attend Court to make her declaration

and that his said mother has not intermarried  
since the death of the aforesaid Thomas Davis.  
This declarant further states that his mother has no  
record of her marriage or the births of her children  
that the record of the births of her children issue  
of their said marriage was carried to the western  
country by her son Samuel Davis some twenty five  
years past, which record is believed to be lost, but  
that several of his declarants brothers have transcripts  
from said record so far as their own ages are concerned  
which he believes to be correct. He further declares  
that he makes the above declaration for the use and  
benefit of his mother said Nancy Davis who as above  
stated is unable to attend Court to make her

his knowledge and belief would say they were  
married about the year seventeen hundred and  
say by four or eight (1787 or 8) that the Said Thomas  
Davis lived the year before he was married with  
his deponent's father, and has known them as  
husband and wife ever since in which relation  
they were respectable members of the Methodist  
Church up to the time of his Said Thomas Davis, death  
and lived within two miles of deponent where  
his widow is still living and raised nine children  
and had ten issue of their Said marriage the younger  
of whom was born in the month of Decem 1812 which  
fact he knows from the birth of his late Son Malachi

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War records of Thomas Davis of South Carolina, who married Nancy Rivers; Bradbury Gilman, Simeon Gilman, and Frederick Rivers.

Revolutionary War data furnished by this office are obtained from claims made to the United States for pension and bounty land based upon the military service of soldiers in that war.

A search of the records fails to show such claims on file on account of the services of Bradbury Gilman, Simeon Gilman, and Frederick Rivers. It is suggested as a possible means of securing data relative to the military service of these soldiers, that you apply to The Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D. C.

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W. 8855, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Thomas Davis.

He was born March 22, 1760 in Chesterfield District, South Carolina; the names of his parents are not given.

Thomas Davis served as a private with the South Carolina troops (specific dates of service not

given), as follows—  
He enlisted a short time before Christmas and served nine months in Captain Morris (Maurice) Murphy's company, under Major Robert Lloyd; one month in Captain John DeWitt's company, Colonel George Hicks' regiment; from February 8, in Captain Ellerbee's company, Colonel George Hicks' regiment, was taken prisoner at the siege of Charleston, May 11, and was discharged on parole, May 19; one month in Captain William Preswood's company; one month in Captain Benton <sup>under</sup> Major Tristan Thomas; and two tours of two weeks each on scouting duty, no names of officers given.

The soldier, Thomas Davis, was allowed pension on his application executed March 17, 1838, then a resident of Chesterfield District, South Carolina. It is also stated that he was pensioned by the state of South Carolina. He died March 20, 1845 in Chesterfield District.

Thomas Davis married in the year 1797 or 1798, in Chesterfield District, South Carolina, Nancy Rivers.

Pension was allowed on an application executed February 16, 1853, at which time the widow, Nancy Davis, was referred to as of "extreme old age". She died December 15, 1853.

They had ten children and reared nine of them. Their first child, Samuel, was born in the summer of 1798, and went to the "western country" about 1828; second child, William, was sixty-three of age in 1853 and living in Chesterfield District, South Carolina; their youngest child was born in December, 1812; the name of the youngest child not given, nor are the names of other children shown.

The soldier, Thomas Davis, referred to an elder brother, but did not state his name. William Rivers was born February 25, 1776 and in 1853 a resident of Chesterfield District, South Carolina, and referred to the widow, Nancy Davis, as his aunt; he stated that

his son, Malachi Rivers, was born August 12, 1812.  
There are no further data in this claim relative to family.

is entitled to receive Twenty Seven dollars and Thirty two cents per annum, during his natural life, commencing on the 4th of March, 1831, and payable semi-annually, on the 4th of March and 4th of September, in every year.


